The number of reported violent incidents, rape and robbery in Madison have decreased since 2018.












The number of homicides in Madison did not change significantly from 2018 through Sep 2022




# The number of **homicides** in Dane County **increased** from 2018-2021




Most firearm-related deaths in Dane County were suicides. There was no significant trend in either firearmrelated **suicides** or homicides.

# Firearm violations in Madison have increased since 2018




# Data summary

- 1. Overall violent incidents in Madison have decreased since 2018, as have reported rape and robbery.
- 2. The number of homicides has increased in Dane County since 2018.
- 3. Firearm-related deaths in Dane County have not changed significantly since 2018.
- 4. The total firearm injury, considering deaths and non-fatal hospital/ER visits, has increased in Dane County since 2019.
- 5. Firearms violations, regardless of whether the firearm was used, have increased in Madison.

#### **Violent Crime Trends in Madison**


January 2018—June 2022, Madison Police Department Data

In this report, we show trends of various kinds of violent crime from the Madison Police Department. These numbers represent real people who have experienced trauma and harm. Regardless of trends, each incident is important and deserves recognition. No level of violence is acceptable in our communities.

There are a wide array of incidents that are classified as violent crimes by police departments. Violent crimes include homicides (murder), sexual assaults (rape), robberies, and aggravated assaults.

#### Violent crime as a whole has trended downwards in Madison over the past four years.

The violent crime offense rate decreased by 22% from 2018 to 2021, and was significantly lower in 2021 than in 2018 and 2019.

#### Firearm Deaths in Dane County




#### Firearm violence is a public health crisis.

On average, one Dane County resident dies every ten days from a firearm. These are preventable deaths that not only impact those directly involved, but contribute to longstanding ripple effects for the larger community. Firearm violence is a leading cause of premature death and requires a public health approach to prevent further death, disability, and trauma. We support evidence-based firearm safety policies in order to prevent gun violence in our community.

From 2016-2021, 77% of firearm deaths among people who live in Dane County were suicides, 22% were homicides, and 1% were of an unintentional or undetermined intent.


Manner of death for firearm deaths among Dane County residents, 2016-2021\*






The number of firearm deaths has been mostly stable for the past six years, except for a 51% statistically significant decrease from 2018 to 2019. There were fourteen Dane County residents who died by firearm homicide in 2021, which is the highest in recent history, although not significantly higher than any of the preceding five years. Regardless of trends, each firearm death is important and preventable.
